Dial your computer to its way back setting, some 4.5 billion years ago to be exact, and prepare to blast away—you're going to make a moon just like ours! All you need to do is to register to play the award-winning Selene videogame, which is now offered in Spanish and English.

Created by CyGaMEs at the Center for Educational Technologies, home of the NASA-sponsored Classroom of the Future at Wheeling Jesuit University in Wheeling, WV, Selene: A Lunar Construction Game teaches you and your students basic geological processes on Earth and in the solar system. At the same time, you help educational researchers study how and when people learn through educational videogames.

Funded by NASA and the National Science Foundation, Selene has won numerous awards, and research has shown that the game causes learning. But we need players. Make the Opportunity Available

Giving students the opportunity to learn with Selene requires some quick and easy assistance from an adult. Because Selene is part of a research project, federal regulations require that players' age and anonymity are confirmed and that parents give permission to play the game. That is why the game requires adult recruiters to provide students' access to the game through a passcode. Becoming a recruiter is simple. Any adult can recruit players age 9 and older.
